If you are responsible for evaluating and purchasing body armor for your agency, the new NIJ Certification Mark (NIJ Mark) may be a helpful tool in identifying NIJ-compliant body armor. As of October 2016, NIJ's CTP began to phase out the NIJ Statement of Compliance in favor of a new registered Mark of Compliance to indicate that specific models of armor have been determined to meet the current ballistic-resistant body armor standard and NIJ CTP requirements and have been approved by NIJ. *Read more*
